HELP SAVE OUR COMMUNITY HALLS!

The Township of Muskoka Lakes is currently determining what we need in the community and how best to deliver that with finite funds. Community halls have been eyed as a drain on the budget, especially as they age and need renovations and repair. There is talk that some should fold to support larger facilities such as arenas and recreational complexes.

They fail to understand that each of these halls and community centres serve as vital community hubs, housing activities and essential services that would otherwise be difficult for many, especially vulnerable seniors, to access given the traveling distances in our township. That is why small rural halls exist and why community volunteers spend numerous hours supporting these treasured spaces.

These halls provide social connection, a sense of belonging and community and free WiFi. We gather, celebrate, play, learn, collaborate, receive support, do business, fundraisers, and pay our respects in them. They also provide affordable rental space for public and private events, meetings and special occasions - online booking at muskokalakes.ca/en/recreation/community-centres.aspx

Each hall is unique, reflecting the history, interest and specific needs of the communities they represent and serve.

WINDERMERE COMMUNITY CENTRE

Originally the Windermere Public School, built in 1913. It still retains the elements of the one-room schoolhouse with chalkboard, school lights and



requisite piano. It received a "Muskoka Build Heritage Award" in 2002, and in 2009 the local Women's Institute founded the Windermere and Area Archives, which operates in its basement. Both the WI and the Lion's Club use the building as their home base, as does the annual Terry Fox Run fundraiser and the Christ Church's Strawberry Social.

WINDERMERE VILLAGE HALL

Originally the village's council hall, it was built in 1953, complete with walk in vault for municipal records. It served as a public washroom and meeting place until activities were transferred to the larger Windermere Community



Centre. It was refurbished/ renovated by the Women's Institute and Lion's Club to create a rental venue for local artisans and events. Rentals continue to this day. July 5th 2024, the Windermere and Area Archives held a historical photo exhibit in the hall to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the Village's incorporation.

RAYMOND HALL

The oldest purpose-built hall in the area, the Raymond Hall was built



in 1921 at the urging of the Women's Institute and drew 450 people at their opening Fowl Supper. It was a popular venue for country dances, Christmas concerts and Halloween costume parties. Nowadays it offers bid euchre/poker, a photography club, potluck

dinners, community appreciation breakfasts and winter church services. It is also used as a warming centre and social/coffee/luncheon club.

ULLSWATER HALL

Built in 1960 for the Ullswater Women's Institute, it was operated by the community until the township took over in 2002 and set up a satellite library in its basement. In 2009 the building was deemed unsafe due to



critical roof and accessibility issues and risked being permanently closed. The tremendous community activism enabled the hall to be saved. It offers game nights, exercise classes, potluck dinners, district senior's programs, CPR training, Christmas Crafts Sale and a

Children's Christmas party with Santa Claus.
