This week's "Historical Interest" Article Maple Leaf House

Excerpts from "Windermere" by Richard Tatley and the Archives of the Windermere Women's Institute

Irenaeus Hough came to Canada in 1871.
He settled in Muskoka, married Ella
"Nellie" Clark in 1895 (one of the eleven children of Thomas Clark - the sawmill owner). He purchased land from Thomas Aitken, built a cottage and took in boarders arriving off the steamers. In 1901 he decided to build Maple Leaf House on the little bay just north of Paton Point.



It was an idyllic setting with woodlands, meadows, sandy beach and fresh spring water. There was a baseball diamond, a farm and vegetable garden. By 1903 it was taking in about 35 guests.

He provided his own wharf for the navigation company steamers, complete with canopy for shelter, and in 1904 he added a new

ballroom to the hotel and large fireplace. Unfortunately in 1905, his son Ivan, decided to build a fire under the front porch "to keep his little dog warm", and in the process burned the entire building down. He promptly

rebuilt on the same site and by 1906 it was complete and expanded to accommodate 60 guests. It was an informal place with baseball, music and singalongs.

In 1941, Irenaeus Hough sold Maple Leaf House to his son Ivan Reginald and retired. Ivan, who had won paddling medals for Canada in the 1924 Olympics,







remodelled the hotel and changed the name to Maple Leaf Lodge. For entertainment the lodge offered tennis, horseback riding, baseball, dancing, boating and swimming at rates of \$16 - \$25 per week, American Plan

In 1946, Ivan sold Maple Leaf Lodge to Frederick "Baldie" Baldwin, a former football coach at the Ontario Agricultural College at Guelph. He and his wife changed

the name to the Baldwins, and expanded with snack bar, several cottages, and new sports like

badminton, croquet, shuffleboard, horseshoes, archery and table tennis. It was known for its

home-cooked meals, and lively parties. Fred Baldwin died in 1962 and it was sold in 1964 to Ruth Paget. She continued to expand the hotel adding additional buildings and



renovations

as well as an outdoor pool. In the 1970's the dining room was expanded and a liquor license obtained.

In 1980 Ruth Paget sold it to Al and Pat Poutanen. They cleaned up the ponds, and remodelled and turned the Baldwins into a winter resort with cross-country skiing, skating, tobogganing, snowshoeing and ice fishing.

They added a sauna, indoor pool, nine hole mini-putt and new office.

The Baldwins has changed hands a number of times since the Poutanens sold the lodge 20 years later, and was well known for bridge, golf and then the arts.

It is no longer operating as a lodge, but sits on the same beautiful property as it always has, awaiting the next metamorphosis.
