### FIRST SETTLERS\*

Prior to the first early settlers and explorers, this area was the hunting grounds of the Ojibway people. It is presently acknowledged as the traditional territory of the Anishinaabe (Ojibway or Chippewa) and home to the Wahta Mohawk people. The first settlers arrived to take advantage of the free land grants. 100-200 acres of land were free with the agreement to clear at least 2 acres, erect a dwelling 16x20 feet and live on the property for not less than 6 months and for at least 5 years. All trees were reserved for the Crown except those cut in cleaning the land for the dwelling or to use as fuel. A sawmill was located on the Dee River, just outside the village.





The first settlers to the area were Frank and Elizabeth Forge, David and Ellen Fife and Thomas Aitken. The actual village came into being on January 1, 1868 when a post office of that name was established at Archibald Taylor's sawmill at the mouth of the Dee River. It was later named after Lake Windermere in the Lake District of England. The post office moved to the home of Thomas Aitken in 1870.
