The Windermere History Project

The Windermere History Project came into being in the summer of 2018, under the guidance of Catherine Nasmith, Architect. It was a model for rural heritage preservation.

The idea for it was, in reality, a "push back" to development challenges that were increasing exponentially as real estate values in Muskoka skyrocketed. The group behind it all were an eclectic group of individuals committed to the preservation of the village of Windermere, a rural community of original land grant families,

farmers, small business owners, year-round and seasonal residents. Our group represented the collective voice of those who share a vision for rural heritage, a belief in celebrating its history, and motivation to shape a sustainable future.

Our backgrounds were varied, including architecture, farming, business, historians, healthcare, and the arts, but together we bring purposeful and strategic focus to our goals for rural heritage preservation.

We all know development is inevitable but how do we ensure it is responsible and thoughtful....respectful of the rural environment that brought the first settlers here, along with the heritage of the visitors and cottagers that followed?

When one pauses to reflect on the village of Windermere, one can begin to realize how special this small community is. Its history, its heritage, it's people, and the fact that it has remained relatively untouched by a developer's hand, is quite remarkable.

How do we help preserve what is here?

It is difficult in many ways to impact change on a 'grand scheme', but sometimes change can start very effectively on a grass roots level. As it gains traction, it influences and directs from the bottom up. With awareness, community engagement and participation, we all become stakeholders in this pro-active preservation and recognition of small community and rural heritage.

There were 3 resources gave the Windermere History Project its vision for community and heritage preservation as well as public engagement.

- **1 ACO-Muskoka** support and direction for building an inventory of buildings and cultural landmarks for the village.
- 2 The Archives of the Windermere Women's Institute They have been instrumental in the gathering, organizing and archiving of important community history and records that are the heart of the community heritage of Windermere, and are the only remaining Women's Institute in the Muskoka District.
- 3 Muskoka Chautauqua The first Canadian branch of the arts and education movement had its roots in Muskoka in Windermere in 1916. They now run a variety of creative arts based programming educational activities in the Muskoka area, and the Chautauqua Festival held in Windermere each summer.

Our goals were and are concurrent – a reminder that one is not without the other.

The history and heritage facts, collected and archived, are the framework for the project, but the anecdotal stories and community engagement are critical for the 'build out' and strength of the structure, and the preservation of the community as a whole. The data and historical facts meld with memories, stories and community involvement to make up the 'whole' of the **Windermere History Project.**

It also serves to remind us that, as a community, if we recognize and celebrate this history and heritage, we have strength and purpose. We can decide what is good for Windermere going forward. We can work together to preserve the heritage of this community for the next generations.
