Some Windermere and Windermere House history

Excerpts from "Muskoka Past and Present" (by Geraldine Coombe, published, 19760)

As most people know, Thomas Aitken, David Fife, young pioneer Scots, and Francis Forges, a young Brit, settled on Lake Rosseau at a place that became known as Windermere. Forge began farming, while Fife & Aitken began

accommodating stray adventurers and sportsmen in search of new fishing grounds, and eventually Aitken's first small house grew to be the Windermere House of today, and Fife's became Fife House.

By 1890, the Windermere House main building and adjoining cottages had accommodation for 220 guests. The rates were \$1.50 per day, with special rates for families. The main dining room could seat 200, and children and their nurses ate in a

separate and smaller dining-room. Long verandahs or "piazzas" of over one-eighth of a mile in extent surrounded the building, affording comfort and shade at all hours of the day and pleasant views of the lake. A sand beach for bathing (safe

for ladies and children in their cumbersome 1890 bathing costumes), tennis, croquet, quoits and the good old English game of bowls provided recreation. Guests hired horses and buggies for driving, and a favourite drive was five miles along the government road to Skeleton Lake. All the rivers and

lakes of the surrounding country provided good fishing. An important attraction to visitors of that era, the nearby Mechanics' Institute contained volumes of philosophy, mechanics, science, art, history. Poetry, biography and general

literature, and provisions were make for the giving of lectures and other literary entertainments. The Free Reading Room was furnished with draughts, dominoes, periodicals, standard magazines, the Toronto newspapers and several of the New York and Chicago dailies.

Equipment at Windermere House was constantly updated over the years. The kitchen was rebuilt, the wooden verandahs were replaced with handsome stone and an enclosed sun room in the 1930's, a bar and outdoor patio were added to the restaurant on the lower level in 1972, "The Terrace" was opened (a new building adjacent to the main lodge)nwith each of its ten luxury suites named after a Canadian province. Mary Elizabeth Aitken, built a number of winterized efficiency units, named "Settlers Bay, on the adjacent property where Fife House, a resort build by pioneer David Fife, was located, before it was demolished in 1970.

Notable events taking place in Windermere over the years included the Lions' Club pancake and maple syrup festival in April, the regatta day in Summer, Thanksgiving dinner for 500 at the United Church, the winter carnival in early March-snow-sculpture, bean supper and snowmobile 10 mile "Poker Run", as well as many Community Centre activities.

Some other "little known facts"

City Nicholas, the 16 year old Toronto girl who, in 1974, set a record time for swimming across Lake Ontario - 32 miles in 15 hours and 15 minutes, trained at Windermere and nearby. Her coach was Al Waites, director of Windermere swimming classes.

A memorial window the the Windermere United Church honours the three pioneers, Thomas Aitken, David Fife and Francis Forge. Francis Forge, the singing boatman who sold farm produce, owned the land south of David Fife's and worked for Timothy Eaton, wealthy Toronto merchant who built a summer residence at Windermere.
