Portage Bay - some background on the history, with a preface on the Indigenous communities that would have lived and travelled in the area.

Muskoka is the traditional territories of the Anishnaabeg, which includes the Ojibwe, Odawa, and Potawatomi Nations, collectively known as the Three Fires Confederacy. The Huron-Wendat and the Haudenosaunee Nations have also walked on this territory over time. Southern portions of Muskoka were the traditional territory of the Wendat when they resided in Simcoe County between AD 1300 and 1650 and they travelled regularly through Muskoka during those centuries. Today Muskoka is home to three sovereign nations: Wahta Mohawks First Nations, Moose Deer Point First Nation, and the Moon River Métis.

Lenore Young (author of "Portage Bay - Memories 1865 - 1945"),

describes Portage Bay as an area regularly traversed by the Ojibwe, who had encampments, first on Tobin Island, and later at the Baisong rapids at Port Carling. They would paddle across the big lake up any one of the three channels created by the two large islands of Wellesley and Florence, which led into the quiet shallows of Portage Bay. Landing at the sand beach at the end, they would hoist canoes on to their shoulders and portage to the hunting grounds around Three Mile Lake, Skeleton Lake and beyond.

It was in the 1860's that the first settlers arrived in Muskoka. advertised as a district rich in farmland. The Public Land Act of 1860 was amended by the Free Grants Act of 1868, and many Europeans saw this as a land of opportunity. The land was "free" for the taking, on condition that the settler agree to clear a minimum of two acres, erected a dwelling at least 16 feet by 20 feet, and live on the property not less than six months of the year. All pine trees were reserved by the Crown, expect those cut in clearing the land. For building a dwelling, or to use as fuel. The futility of trying to grow crops in the barren ground soon became apparent.

Nonetheless, hardy individuals arrived with hope in their hearts and a willingness to work hard. The first to arrive in the area established claims around Three Mile Lake, and soon the Sheas, Vetches, and others and had built homes and welcomed their families to this part of Muskoka.

At about the same time, Thomas Aitken took up land at the site of the Village of Windermere, along with some of his Scottish cousins and another relative, David Fife. Francis Forge from Yorkshire settled on the bay overlooking Wellesley Island. Forge was soon followed by William Dawson, who established a farm on Portage Bay.

Another man also arrived about the same time. Very little is known about this man, other than he came from England, he was a bachelor, and the son of a "well-to-do" family who had left home to seek his fortune. His name was William (Billy) Smallbone. He picked a 62 acre spot on the sand beach in Portage Bay, built his shanty and cleared enough land to plant a garden. He eked out a meagre existence with the game he shot and the fish he caught.


