With the **Chautauqua Festival** starting in only 10 days in the village of Windermere, we thought it would be a good idea to give some background on Chautauqua - its origin, history and evolution, as well as how it found it's way to Windermere over 100 years ago.

The word "chautauqua" is Iroquois and means either "two moccasins tied together" or "jumping fish."

**Chautauqua** (*shə-TAW-kwə*) was an adult education and social movement in the United States that began on Lake Chautaugua, New York in 1874 by John Heyl Vincent and Lewis Miller. The intent was educational, and it was never affiliated with any one religious denomination.

The Chautauqua brought entertainment and culture for the whole community, with speakers, teachers, musicians, showmen, preachers, and specialists of the day. Many towns, especially in rural areas where opportunities for secondary education were limited, established "Chautauquas."

The educational summer camp format proved popular for families and was widely copied by several Chautauguas. Within a decade, "Chautauqua assemblies" (or simply "Chautauquas"), named after the location in New York, sprang up in various North American locations. This reflected the intense desire for self-improvement through education. "Chautauqua" had a strong influence on the rural communities and became shorthand for an organized gathering intended to introduce people to the great ideas, new ideas, and issues of public concern.

The popular movement pretty much died out by the mid-1930s. Most historians cite the rise of the car culture, radio, and movies as the causes. Also, as professional and educational opportunities increased, interest in Chautauquas dwindled. And finally, the Depression itself made Chautauquas economically impossible for organizers and audiences. There are however quite a few Chautauquas that continue to thrive.

There were a number of Chautauqua's across Canada, beginning in the early 20th century. Muskoka Chautauqua was started by Charles Sinclair Applegath in Windermere in 1916. In 1921, he purchased the **Waskada Hotel** on Tobin Island, renamed it the **Epworth Inn**, and thus began the **Muskoka Assembly** of the Canadian Chautauqua. Years later, the Epworth Inn was purchased, re-invented and renamed **Wigwassan Lodge**.
