Muskoka Chautauqua is a not-for-profit organization fostering arts and culture, culminating in a summer festival in the historic village of Windermere.

Muskoka Chautauqua is a community for the curious and the creative. Springing from a tradition that started 100 years ago, when the village of Windermere attracted North America's leading thinkers to its shores, Muskoka Chautauqua is one of the longest-running and more iconic cultural institutions in the region.

With more than 15 Chautauqua communities across North America, Muskoka Chautauqua is the only remaining Canadian chapter. After going dormant after the Great Depression, Gary Froude and Gayle Dempsey revived the concept in the late 1990's and officially relaunched Muskoka Chautauqua in 2004.

Muskoka Chautauqua continues to grow and evolve, with a goal of providing a breadth of diverse arts and culture programming to the residents and visitors of the Muskoka Lakes region.

To be a recognized leader in the provision of inclusive and innovative arts-based programming for enrichment and life-long learning, while contributing to the economic and social vitality and offering a place for all in the community.

Mission

To collaborate with partners, diverse people and communities to present innovative, multi-disciplinary arts-based programs that inspire lifelong learning, well-being and resiliency by celebrating creativity and Muskoka's heritage and natural environment.



Home in Windermere

In 1921, Chautauqua first graced the shores of Windermere, launching its inaugural summer season in Muskoka. Over a century later, Windermere Village continues to be the heart and home of our summer festival—embraced by residents, seasonal visitors, and cottagers alike.

In 2024, we continued to deepen our relationships with community partners and neighbours, working together to create a festival that reflects the unique spirit and creativity of Windermere. Throughout the season, we collaborated with Windermere House, Windermere Women's Institute, Taylor Farms, Muskoka Lakes Chamber of Commerce, Muskoka Lakes Association, Windermere Lions Club, Windermere Golf & Country Club, The Lang Family Foundation, Explorer's Edge, Muskoka Tourism, Windermere Christ Church, Windermere United Church, and the Township of Muskoka Lakes, welcomed support from dedicated volunteers, and celebrated the many hands and hearts that make this festival possible.



One of the highlights of this year was our ongoing Community Conversation series, which brought neighbours together at Windermere House to envision the future of the village. These meaningful gatherings have already sparked several inspiring projects. The revival of a community newspaper, the Windermere Gazette, is now underway, offering a new platform for local voices. A brand-new community playground is currently being developed at the Windermere Village Hall in collaboration with the township. Meanwhile, the waterfront planters were brought back to life with donated plants and countless volunteer hours—a beautiful example of community spirit in action.

As part of our efforts to build a more connected and vibrant future, we've also begun mapping the current cultural landscape of Windermere and the surrounding area. This important work will help identify future opportunities for engagement and growth, and we look forward to building upon this living resource with further community input.

Our beloved community banner project also came to life in a beautiful way this year. Volunteers lovingly stitched together several years' worth of collected banner squares, which were proudly displayed during the festival. New squares were created on-site under the theme "Give Thanks," forming the 2024 banner. This stunning piece will be displayed again at the 2025 festival as a symbol of gratitude, creativity, and the deep-rooted community spirit that defines Windermere.

The festival itself culminated in the return of a cherished tradition—the Windermere Family Fun Day at the waterfront. This joyful celebration brought together families, artists, and neighbours for a day filled with art, play, and shared connection, truly showcasing the collaborative heart that makes Windermere such a special place to call home. We also launched an exciting new tradition this year with the inaugural Great Windermere Business Canoe Race, where local businesses competed for glory and the coveted Golden Paddle!

Throughout the Year

While our flagship arts and culture festival in Windermere remains the highlight of our summer, Muskoka Chautauqua continues to bring vibrant arts programming to the region year-round. The very popular 'Company of Good Cheer' Coffee Houses hosted by Brandy Creek Music & Publications returned to The Muskoka Place Gallery during the fall and winter months. Every night saw packed houses and lively performances, keeping the community connected through music during the shoulder seasons.



In 2024, the Board of Directors embarked on a new strategic planning process that will guide the next phase of Muskoka Chautauqua's growth and impact. This work is grounded in our ongoing commitment to inclusion, accessibility, and community-building.






